Fostering Well-Being and Literacy

Early Intervention Teachers at 22 KPR elementary schools have been supporting intentional reading instruction for students who have needs in both reading and social emotional learning. Through reading instruction and mindfulness, educators help children develop knowledge and tools to manage stress, regulate emotions and face challenges with optimism, resilience and compassion.

Working alongside educators in their classrooms, the Early Intervention Teachers support reading development of Grade 1 students at the same time as supporting students' social emotional learning skills using a framework called MindUP.

This intentional pairing of mindfulness and literacy is fostering social and emotional awareness, enhancing well-being and promoting academic success.

Over 1,800 intermediate students across KPR participated in the Take TECH 2023 Design Challenge. Kent Public School (PS) was one of many schools whose students joined this exciting



Students were asked to reflect on the UN's Sustainable Development Goals and design a product that would improve sustainability or help solve a problem in their community and beyond.

Each class received toolboxes and prototype kits. In addition to construction supplies, students were provided with electrical materials such as LED lights and were encouraged to use school supplies like micro bits and sensors to incorporate elements of coding and technology into their work.

From building miniature houses to address homelessness in the community, to incorporating energy efficient features such as solar panels, students gained valuable experience in problem solving and innovation.

Through teamwork, creativity and innovation, the Take TECH design challenge participants are leading us to a brighter future.

Celebrating Volunteers at KPR

Kelly sits on School Council, supports the nutrition program, helps with fieldtrips, serves weekly hot lunches, plans and supervises school dances, bakes with Learning and Life Skills and Kindergarten classes, organizes fundraising initiatives and coordinates involvement in community events among many other significant contributions. Urban Indigenous Alternative Secondary School Program

This year, KPR launched the urban Indigenous Alternative Secondary School Program (ASSP) in partnership with the Nogojiwanong Friendship Centre.

The program, also called Waawiye Kinoomaagzijig (Circle of Learning) was developed for urban Indigenous students who may be having difficulty in the traditional classroom setting or who would benefit from a learning structure supported by Indigenous knowledge systems, community capacity, and resources to help them reach their goals and achieve success.

Students earn credits and work towards their Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD), with a focus on Indigenous knowledge, Indigenous languages, and land-based experiential learning. Through a traumainformed, culture-based education model, the ASSP supports Indigenous student success and well-being, fosters positive self-identification, promotes strong Indigenous leadership and provides learners with the skills, knowledge, attitudes and values needed to fully participate in their communities and society.



"The program gives us a community to belong to, we see ourselves reflected in our peers and are able to build long-lasting friendships and connections. It is incredibly beneficial to our healing in all aspects of our lives; culturally, emotionally, mentally, and spiritually, giving us the space we need to be successful in school," shares a student in the program.

Equity-Based Learning and Action in Support of Newcomers and Refugees

Students at Harold Longworth Public School (PS) showed their humanitarian spirit by creating artwork and postcards with welcome messages for young refugees who have been displaced by war or other crises, as part of the Students Rebuild "Welcoming Refugees Project."

"The goal was for our students to build community and increase their understanding of global issues. This year, the focus was on building compassion and understanding of the realities that refugees and their families face," shares Tanya Doyle, Principal.

Students reflected on their experience with the project:

"I found out that refugees basically have to leave everything behind and restart their lives. Making these postcards was a way that we can encourage refugees and welcome them to our country, " shares Grade 6 student,

"When we were learning about refugees, I felt sad because they have to leave their home country. I am happy that we are a safe place for them and they can come to Canada. I hope my postcard makes them feel like this is home for them," says Grade 7 student, Ella. For every piece of art received, Students Rebuild made a \$5 donation to refugee-aid organizations. Students in Grades JK – 8 produced many bright and colourful postcards and raised \$1,450. Way to go Harold Longworth PS!





United Against Islamophobia

In May, the Board of Trustees welcomed and honoured students and a staff member from Courtice Secondary School (SS) for their collective response and advocacy to address Islamophobia in their school and community.

Courtice SS students, supported by their teachers, were recently honoured by the National Council of Canadian Muslims with a Courage Award in recognition of their advocacy, courage and commitment to justice.

Islamophobia, anti-Muslim hate, and all acts of hate, cause serious, ongoing harm to students, staff, families and community members. Understanding, disrupting and dismantling Islamophobia is a priority that requires ongoing commitment. In the Kawartha Pine Ridge District School Board, we continue to work alongside students, families and community groups to support welcoming, inclusive environments.

Literacy and Numeracy Supports

To support strong foundations in essential literacy and numeracy skills, early intervention teachers, coaches, and consultants work directly with students, educators and principals to support success.

KPR's "Readers Now/Lecteurs Maintentant" helps educators apply learning about four areas of reading to guide instruction. This builds educators' own capacity and supports students to become increasingly independent and confident in literacy.

"Teachers are even more intentional in their planning. They are using the resources provided by the system along with the ideas/strategies that our coach has been sharing with them... When sharing the academic outcomes students are experiencing, there was evidence that students are becoming more independent and are using the strategies being taught," reflected one principal.

The work of embedded math coaches and consultants in seven of our schools, has provided capacity building opportunities for educators to learn about strategies that improve student success in problem solving.

"Something new that was brought in that was helpful to me is number lines because they are easier for me than using pictures... I could use them in a different way," said a James Strath student.

Students and educators across KPR will continue to benefit from these supports next year, as we support all students in achieving success.

Responsible and Accountable Fiscal Management

In June 2023, the Board approved a balanced operating budget of \$483,759,334 and capital budget of almost \$45 million for the upcoming school year. The budget is in compliance with Ministry of Education requirements and reflects priorities set out within the Board Action Plan, and overall Board goals.

Next year elementary enrolment is projected to increase by 765 students from the previous year, with secondary enrolment expected to increase by 130 students.

Board grant revenues are determined provincially based on elementary and secondary student enrolment. Total board enrolment for 2023–2024 is expected to be 35,723 students.


Our budget also includes over \$68 million in support for students with special needs and funding to advance a number of key strategic priorities.

Capital project highlights for 2023–2024 will include over \$17 million for construction of the new Northglen neighbourhood elementary school in Bowmanville, and \$3 million for a school addition at Murray Centennial Public School in Trenton, in addition to a number of capital building and school improvement projects.

We annually allocate significant investments in improvements and enhancements to our schools. We want to ensure that our physical spaces can keep pace with the advanced programming and instructional practices envisioned by our amazing staff.

Your Voice - Your Plan!

Every four years, KPR's Board of Trustees start a process to develop a renewed Strategic Plan for the school board. A strategic plan is like a roadmap for the organization; it focuses our efforts on student success goals and informs decision-making and budget priorities.

Nearly 2,400 people shared their thoughts and applied over 83,000 priority ratings in two online Strategic Planning conversations. And over 250 students, staff, parents/caregivers and community members participated in face-to-face focus group sessions about future priorities.

This important feedback will support the renewal of KPR's Strategic Priorities. The new Strategic Plan will be approved by the Board of Trustees in December 2023.

Elevate - Student Leadership Event

Student leaders from KPR secondary schools came together for a day of learning, leading and connecting at KPR Elevate 2023 in May. Five student leaders from each secondary school were invited to participate in a series of activities designed to build capacity and promote fun. The day was also an opportunity to celebrate the accomplishments of these amazing students, who have been working alongside other students and staff to



support many meaningful activities – from student government and decision making, to student activities, spirit weeks and dances.

It was a great day of networking, planning and fun led by staff advisors and Student Trustees Maria Mahfuz and Kelly Mitchell.
