#### Why is KPR taking part in National Sweater Day?

Engaging in learning and awareness about combatting Climate Change is important at KPRDSB. Our Board Action Plan speaks to a system action to strengthen environmental consciousness and explore strategies to reduce negative ecological impacts.

#### **Causes of Climate Change**

- Greenhouse Gas Emissions from Fossil Fuels: Carbon dioxide (CO2), methane (CH4), and other greenhouse gases trap heat in the Earth's atmosphere, leading to global warming.
- **Deforestation:** The removal of trees reduces the planet's capacity to absorb CO2, contributing to increased atmospheric concentrations of greenhouse gases.



## Did You Know?

Canada's resource use is among the highest in the world! Much of Canada's carbon footprint is the result of fossil fuel use, mainly from transmissions, heating and electricity.


